<p>Source (in original language written sources: Greek, Latin):</p> <p>ὁ δὲ καὶ γάμους ἐποίησεν ἐν Σούσοις αὐτοῦ τε καὶ τῶν ἐταίρων: αὐτὸς μὲν τῶν Δαρείου θυγατέρων τὴν πρεσβυτάτην Βαρσίνην ἠγάγετο, ὡς δὲ λέγει Ἀριστόβουλος, καὶ ἄλλην πρὸς ταύτην, τῶν Ὀχου θυγατέρων τὴν νεωτάτην Παρύσατιν. ἤδη δὲ ἦν αὐτῷ ἠγμένη καὶ ἡ Ὀξυάρτου τοῦ Βακτρίου παῖς Ῥωξάνη. Leipzig. 1907)</p>	<p>Translation:</p> <p><i>Then he held also weddings at Susa, both his own and for his Companions; he married Dareius eldest daughter Barsine, and, at Aristobulus says, another wife besides, the youngest daughter of Ochus, Parysatis. He had already taken to wife Roxane, this daughter of Oxyartes the Bactrian. To Hephaestion he gave Drypetis, a daughter of Dareius, sister to his own wife, for he desired that Hephaestion's children should be his own nephews and nieces.</i></p> <p>(Arrian, <i>Anabasis</i>, VII, 4, 4-5.
